### **LOOK FORWARD**

- 1. Have a look at the definition of faith in Hebrews 11:1. What is inherently challenging about this? What helps?
- Abraham went to Canaan as a stranger; where he looked and felt like he didn't fit in. It sounds like a good description of following Jesus!
  - a. Have a look at Romans 12 in The Message "Don't become so well-adjusted to your culture that you fit into it without even thinking."
  - b. In what ways does your faith in Jesus make a difference to the way you see what's going on in our world and what it might mean for you?
- 3. Abraham could live by faith because he was "looking forward to the city."
  - a. What is this city according to Heb 12:22 & Rev 21:1-4?
  - b. As you think about the decisions you are making right now, how might you decide differently with eternity in mind?



Week 2 • 12 July 2020 • Hebrews 11:11-16

### STAND FIRM

- 1. If Abraham's faith was grounded in looking forward, Sarah's faith was in the character of God.
  - a. What is associated with the faithfulness of God in these verses? (1 Thes 5:23-24; 2 Thes 3:3; 1 John 1:9)
  - b. How does this compare with what you hope God will do in your life?
- 2. Sarah could trust God even when the reality of her own body told her it was impossible!
  - a. What does Jesus teach on this in Mark 9:21-24?
  - b. What impossible situation are you seeking God about right now? Why not pray together about it.
- 3. Becoming more like Jesus means we'll be growing in faithfulness. How are you doing with the following questions? Ask God for the grace to grow here.
  - a. Can you be relied upon?
  - b. Do you keep your promises?
  - c. Do you complete tasks that have been asked of you?
  - d. Do you tell the truth even when it's difficult?



Week 3 • 19 July 2020 • Hebrews 11:17-19

### TRUSTING GOD WITH EVERYTHING

- 1. Have a look at the narrative of Genesis 22:1-14 and imagine being Abraham for a moment. Why not share together about what stands out, what is challenging or what doesn't make sense.
- 2. Are there areas of life or situations where you struggle to trust God. Is there anything you're afraid God might ask you to do?
  - a. Why not share about that together and pray about it.
  - b. Are there things in Abraham's story that are an encouragement here?
- 3. V17 tells us that God was testing Abraham's faith. Has there been a time in your life where you felt your faith was being tested?
  - a. What was it like?
  - b. What did you learn?
  - c. What good things come out of faith being tested?
- 4. This episode is a reminder of something so profound God can be trusted even with death. See 1 Cor 15:17-20, John 3:16 and Daniel 3:16-18.
  - a. How does this affect what is important in life for you?
  - b. How does it make the message of Jesus distinctive in our world?
